One Step Closer to a Blood Test for Alzheimer's

A study presented July 16th at the Alzheimer's Association International Conference 2019 suggests researchers may be one step closer to a potential breakthrough for treating the devastating and widespread disease — a simple blood test to detect proteins that accumulate in the brains of patients with Alzheimer's disease, causing neuron death.

A blood test that recognizes such a biomarker for Alzheimer's in the brain could "revolutionize clinical trials today and in the future," says Maria Carrillo, chief science officer of the Alzheimer's Association. "And think of the implications for clinical practice once we have a therapeutic."

In that event, as she describes it, patients could one day get a quick blood test during their annual checkup to see if they have elevated biomarkers for Alzheimer's. Those who do would then be referred to a specialist to begin a course of treatment as soon as possible.

In the new study, researchers at the National Center for Geriatrics and Gerontology in Japan developed a prototype for a blood test that "reliably" picked up the accumulation of amyloid precursor protein (APP) with 93 percent specificity in the blood of 201 patients with mild cognitive impairment, Alzheimer's disease, or non-Alzheimer's dementia. It also picked up the protein in some subjects who were cognitively normal. (While amyloid plaque is considered a reliable biomarker of Alzheimer's, some of those with the plaque never go on to develop signs of the disease.)

Last year the same group of researchers found that blood biomarkers of this kind of amyloid protein were as reliable as the current gold standard of diagnosing Alzheimer's with positron-emission tomography (PET) or measuring the protein through cerebrospinal fluid. A blood test is much less invasive and more cost effective than a PET scan.

The new blood test developed in Japan may also be more efficient at picking up preclinical stages of Alzheimer's disease, according to the study. This would enable earlier intervention. Currently, changes in amyloid protein can exist for as long as two decades before the point at which a patient would be clinically diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease.

"Clinical trials haven't succeeded up until now, likely because we need to find a novel therapeutic and be able to catch people early in the disease before it is established and becomes a runaway train," says Barry Greenberg, director of the Alzheimer's Disease Translational Center at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine.

Some of those hearing news of the blood test remain cautious, citing the need for the study to be replicated in a larger, more diverse population, or noting that a blood test that detects other Alzheimer's biomarkers, such as viruses or a protein called tau, might turn out to be better biomarkers to target in a blood test going forward.

Ultimately, "we need effective biomarkers at all stages of disease — before and after onset of symptoms — to both measure progression and test potential therapies to see if they slow or perhaps reverse the progression," says Eliezer Masliah, director of the National Institute on Aging's Division of Neuroscience.

M.A.C.O. Mumbles

As usual, no real news from M.A.C.O. HQ this month. No word yet on re-worked/re-published manuals, like a uniform manual or training manual, but so far, nothing. You can still use the old training manual for your Academy coursework... and some of the colleges have moved at the Academy.

There's been another administrative change: instead of three reporting groups, there are only two. As far as I can see, this doesn't do anything for anyone on the front lines, nor does it affect anyone on our team in any way – except for sending in the monthly report, and in any case we're in Group 1 instead of our old... Group 1. Huh. *shrugs* Meanwhile, RPG stuff.

I'm still looking through my 'new' RPG, "The Price of Freedom" by West End Games. It looks like a solid game system, with good 'crunch' (rules system) and interesting 'flavor' (the setting and the 'fluff'.) Its set in a late-1980s idea of a world in which the Soviet Union has conquered the United States. It's still fairly early days, and the PCs are Americans fighting back against the Communist (expletive deleted.) Watch "Red Dawn" (at least, the original one... I have never seen the remake, so I can't tell you anything there.) Eventually, I'll read through the rest of it and give y'all a review.

My RPG group has just finished their second adventure in the home-brew world we're currently in, playing AD&D First Edition. There are an awful lot of changes between AD&D and the original 'white box' D&D, but it's still quite loose in the ruleset. Some things just seem added on, and the more modern concept of consistency – of die rolls, of situational modifiers, even of 'rolling high is always (or never) good' – just isn't there. You can see how things got added, and why things changed.

Observation 1: Modern RPGs all seem to minimize randomness. At character creation, for example, the six (or seven) basic attributes¹ used to be rolled with six-sided dice; now, most games call for a point-buy system of one type or another. I've lost track of the number of characters I've played who died in combat with a random encounter; now, all encounters are designed in advance, and in such a way that the encounter is 'balanced' with the party more likely to defeat than be defeated. (Old school gamers learned to have their PCs run away a lot, early & often.)

Personally, I prefer some of the randomness. It's great to be able to limit poor rolls of the dice, but if you don't risk having those, than you just don't get the wonderful amazing super-rolls, either. For example, I've had uncounted PCs with five stats in the 9-12 range, with one 14-16; on the other hand, I had a paladin with 17 in four abilities, with 18 in the other two, generated honestly with Method IV from the 2nd Edition Player's Guide.

Observation 2: In many modern RPGs, there are few – if any – tables that must be referred to during play. The older the game, the more tables were needed, especially in combat. Original D&D and (first edition) AD&D had a collection of matrixes for combat for different character types; in 2nd Edition of AD&D, these matrixes were replaced by a game mechanic called "To Hit Armor Class Zero"

¹ In D&D, AD&D, AD&D 2nd Edition, D&D 3.0, 3.5, Pathfinder, D&D 4th Edition, D&D 5th Edition, the d20 Star Wars Games, etc: Strength, Intelligence, Wisdom, Dexterity, Constitution, and Charisma. AD&D added Comeliness with the Unearthed Arcana tome. The Monthly Roar 8

(THAC0), that required players to do addition and subtraction of both positive and negative numbers. 3E, 3.5, and later replaced both descending Armor Class and THACO with ascending Armor Class and a set of Attack Bonuses – making the math be addition only, with an occasional penalty having to be subtracted. Once the DM had the most common used penalties and bonuses lodged in his head, you wouldn't have to look at any tables during standard combats.

I like using a chart – mainly because I don't like math-ing in my head. Some systems go too far with their charts, though. (I refer you to ROLEMASTER, SPACEMASTER, and to a somewhat lesser degree, MIDDLE EARTH ROLEPLAYING GAME (MERP) to see what chart insanity can lead to.) I find myself beginning to ramble. More next time, and as always, I'd love to hear from y'all.

It is possible Space X may have a rocket on display by September as well. Hosted by the USS Zavala, the Region 3 Starfleet Day at Space Center Houston will be extra special this year. Start making your plans to be part of the celebration by joining us on **Saturday, September 14, 2019.**

The Region will do a pre-paid advance group ticket purchase to reduce your cost to attend. With fees included, your total is \$18 per ticket (regardless of age). This requires a minimum 15 ticket purchase so please get your payment submitted by the deadline. Purchase your tickets by going to <u>gm@region3.org</u>. Payment MUST be received <u>no later than Tuesday, September 3, 2019</u>. There are no refunds for this type of advance group sale purchase.

Following our day at Space Center Houston, we will convene for supper at 6:00 pm (we know you'll be starving by then after the day of activity) at Victor's American Diner and Deli, 1425 NASA Parkway (literally next door to SCH).

Space Center Houston opens for visitors at 10:00 am. Parking is \$5.00 after 9:00 am. We will gather in the parking lot prior to opening to distribute tickets at 9:30 am. We will convene at precisely 10:30 am for a group photo inside. Dress casually for your busy day at SCH (Region or chapter shirts or any Star Trek themed shirt) and bring your uniform to change into for supper (another group photo op).

The designated motel for this event is the Days Inn & Suites, 201 N. Texas Ave., Webster, TX 77598. They have offered us a discounted rate of \$74.99 for a Single King and \$84.99 for Double Queen beds (plus taxes and fees). Please call the motel directly at **281-724-4672** to make reservations. The group code is Starfleet Region 3. There are more Double rooms on the second floor, but be aware there is no elevator. They do have handicapped accessible rooms on the first floor.
